# To The Chief Musician upon Nehiloth

- only in the title of Psalms 5.
- It is probably derived from a root meaning "to bore," "perforate," (pierced with holes) and hence denotes perforated wind instruments of all kinds. The psalm may be thus regarded as addressed to the conductor of the temple choir which played on flutes and such-like instruments.

## Psalm 5:1-3

5 Give ear to my words, O LORD,  
consider my meditation.

<sup>2</sup> Hearken unto the voice of my cry, my  
King, and my God: for unto thee will I  
pray.

<sup>3</sup> My voice shalt thou hear in the  
morning, O LORD; in the morning will I  
direct my prayer unto thee, and will  
look up.

There are seven major types of psalms


- lament psalms

**Imprecatory psalms are those in which the author imprecates; calls down calamity, destruction, and God's anger and judgment on his enemies.**
